Dear Registered Quantity Surveyors,

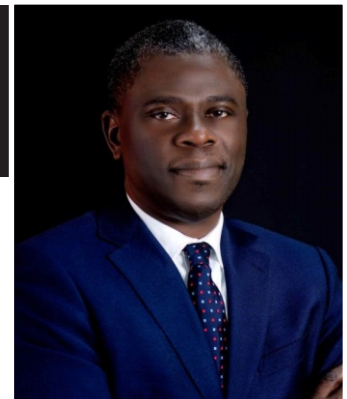

Inauguration of the 10th Board of the Quantity Surveyors Registration Board of Nigeria by the Honourable Minister of Housing & Urban Development Arc. Ahmed Musa Dangiwa, on Tuesday 26th March, 2024

The 10th Board of the Quantity Surveyors Registration Board of Nigeria was inaugurated by the Honourable Minister of Housing and Urban Development, Arc. Ahmed Musa Dangiwa on Tuesday 26th March, 2024 for a three year tenure. The fifteen (15) member Board which was inaugurated for a first term in office has QS. Obafemi O. Onashile MPM, FNIQS, PPNIQS, RQS as its President.

The Minister in his inaugural speech charged the newly inaugurated Board of QSRBN to ensure the promotion of integrity, honesty, transparency, and fairness in the course of performing

their professional duties. Dangiwa stated that the appointment of the Board members was a call to National Service, saying that they had a critical role to play in fixing the challenges facing the housing sector through the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development, as intended by President Bola Ahmed Tinubu.

The President of the newly inaugurated Board – QS. Obafemi O. Onashile MPM, FNIQS, PPNIQS, RQS in his response, pledged that the board would work without prejudice in the discharge of their duties, and also work in collaboration with

the Federal Government, the Nigerian Institute of Quantity Surveyors (NIQS) and other stakeholders to upscale the impact of the Quantity Surveying profession on the national economy of the

COMMUNIQUE

After the two-day Assembly, the
communique for the
event was issued as below:

1. There is an urgent need to align project initiation and implementation with the National Integrated Infrastructure Master Plan (NIMP) and not be driven by political and other forms of patronage. Furthermore, the assembly stressed the importance of ease of doing business, sanctity of contract and respect for rule of law to the success of projects in Nigeria.

2. The growing investment in

data centres and other non-conventional built assets in Nigeria and across the West Africa sub-region calls for new skills and competencies for quantity surveyors in order to participate in the emerging market opportunities.

3. That Quantity surveyors should upskill themselves as project leaders and early technology adopters in leading multi-disciplinary practices that offer one-stop consultancy services to clients in line with trending preferences globally.

4. NIQS & QSRBN will continue to support a culture of continuous learning among professional quantity surveyors via regular webinars, workshops, conferences and certification programs thus equipping QS with versatile skills, enhancing the prospects of members a successful career and contributing positively to the Country's economy.

5. Quantity Surveying firms and Quantity Surveying practitioners must understand global investment demands and the need to acquire new competencies in sustainability and carbon costing.

6. Since technological advancement and globalization are realities that have come to stay, quantity surveyors must acquire skills and competencies in the use of technology-driven tools and methodologies to ward off the effects of these global forces and to remain competitive and relevant.

7. Since the demand for traditional quantity

surveying services are waning, professional quantity surveyors must acquire the collaborative mindset and build new skillsets to deliver newer services like transaction advisory consulting in PPP, risk management, facility management, green building project management, alternative dispute resolution approaches like arbitration, mediation and other evolving professional services.

8. That Quantity Surveyors must demonstrate high ethical conduct, moral excellence, integrity, and professionalism in the discharge of their professional services and in the different assignments as may be entrusted to them by the society.

9. Since political power is foundational to the judicious use of resources, professional quantity surveyors must go into politics as political office holders at different levels and use their professional training to contribute to improving the economy of the country.

10. Professional quantity surveyors as individuals and as a group must continue to develop and use their critical thinking capability in mapping out solutions to myriads of political, infrastructure procurement and employment problems facing us as a country and as individuals.

11. There is a need for Special Interest or Think Thank Groups within the Quantity Surveying profession who will work to develop community of practices around emerging opportunities

The Minister of Housing and Urban Development, Arc. Ahmed Dangiwa said the planned 50,000 housing units nationwide will help generate over 1.2 million direct and indirect jobs.

Speaking at the 2024 Quantity Surveyors Registration Board of Nigeria (QSRBN) conference in Abuja, the minister noted that the 'Renewed Hope Cities and Estates Programme' is designed to be a catalyst for economic growth. "The construction and development of these new areas will generate employment opportunities,

stimulate local businesses, and attract investments. The 50,000 units that we plan to deliver under phase 1 will create 1,250,000 direct and indirect construction jobs for architects, engineers, quantity surveyors, masons, bricklayers, electricians, plumbers, iron benders etc.

"This is in addition to the value chain effects of purchase, supply of building materials, businesses around the construction sites, etc," Dangiwa stated.

13TH MEETING OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL ON LAND, HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT HELD IN GOMBE, GOMBE STATE FROM 11TH - 15TH NOVEMBER 2024

The National Council on Land, Housing and Urban Development held its 13th meeting in Gombe, Gombe state from 11th - 15th November 2024. A 3- man delegate from Quantity Surveyors Registration Board of Nigeria, comprising QS Obafemi O. Onashile, FNIQS, PPNIQS, the President, QS. Murtala M. Aliyu FNIQS, PPNIQS, the immediate Past President and QS. Abdullahi U. Alkali FNIQS, the Registrar presented a memorandum titled **FINDING LASTING AND PERMANENT SOLUTION TO THE ISSUE OF BUILDING AND ENGINEERING STRUCTURE COLLAPSE INCIDENTS IN NIGERIA** at the event.

The memo presented is summarized as thus:

Building and engineering structure collapse is not peculiar to Nigeria, however its frequency in the country is worrisome and **appears the country lacks the capacity to stop or at least abate this menace which is not true.**

Efforts put in so far by stakeholders including the government to abate the menace has **not yielded the right results as there are still building and engineering structure collapse** around us on a nearly daily basis.

Section 14.2.b of the Constitution of The Federal Republic of Nigeria states that “**the security and welfare of the people shall be the primary purpose of government...**”. This means that the safety and health of every citizen is a primary responsibility of government. The government headed by the Federal Government has a duty to protect the citizens from every danger including dangers from building and engineering structures collapse and therefore, for every loss of life or property of the citizens, the government can be held accountable unless it can show that it has exercised its own relevant duty. Part of this duty of government is to make reasonable laws including regulations and ensure strict enforcement without slack or bias.

The **current concept of the National Building Code is not a panacea for building and engineering structure collapse** due to its many weaknesses as earlier highlighted. The NBC can however suffice as the approved compendium of Building Regulations in Nigeria. **To avoid conflict within the document, the Part III Enforcement should be expunged and could be made as part of a separate and independent enacted Law that can be enforced and controlled.**

The **hazards from building and engineering structure collapse should be treated and classified as “Potential Grave Risks”** as such it requires a very comprehensive, robust and pragmatic approach of tackle, taking into cognition how other countries of the world have addressed similar problem.

In view of the growth and development, the building and engineering industry has witnessed in the last four decades, **the Factories Act 1974 as updated and referred to as Occupational Health and Safety**

Act 2004 (incidentally administered under Federal Ministry of Labour) has become ineffective and inefficient. There is a need to refocus Safety principles in the Nigeria Building and Engineering industry from that of “compensatory principle” i.e that of enforcement of procurement of insurance to cover for potential losses that may arise from the occurrence of possible risks which in essence is a passive management of risks to a new approach of “preventive principle” which is now the globally acceptable standard i.e. that of ensuring that a potential risk does not occur at all costs which entails both active and passive management.

There is an urgent **need to carve out an independent set of duties or specialization within the building and engineering processes focused purely on construction health, safety and environment (CHSE).** The duties will span both design and construction stages of building or engineering projects. It shouldn't be presumed that the Building practitioners only can solely handle CHSE as Builders are usually not involved in the design stage of development before contract awards. Costs of implementing effective CHSE on a project could be significant and if not factored into early cost advice to developers right at inception of projects there will be a great challenge in insisting on its implementation in future during construction stage. Under the UK and European regulations, there is now a compulsory requirement for a consultant knowledgeable in construction processes and specializing in CHSE (quite often a structural engineer or a QS firm) to take active responsibility for HSE at design stage and which devolves into a supervisory responsibility during construction stage when the Builders' take over the active HSE management.

PRAYERS

The following prayers were made to the Council:

- i. The Government led by the Federal Government should urgently fulfill its constitutional duty of providing security for the citizens against building collapse by **enacting a Construction Health, Safety and Environment Law** that stipulates the roles of each stakeholder in building and engineering construction development processes, and their exact duties, such that where there is a failure or a building / engineering collapse it is easy to use the assigned duties to evaluate who and who have failed in undertaking their duties in line with the enacted law. (The objective is to have a Law similar to the Construction Design and Management (CDM) Act of UK)
- ii. The Government should as a matter of priority **establish an independent, body corporate, self-funding, Building and Engineering Construction Commission (BECC)** to be headed by a building / engineering professional with other Board members nominated from government (both Federal and State), coalition of Built Environment Professional Institutes and from Federation of Construction Industry (FOCI) contractors, to license and control ethics in the Building and Engineering Industry and oversee professional consultancy as well as building/ engineering construction practices in Nigeria. (The objective is to have something equivalent to the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) that controls trading in equities, something also similar to the National Construction Authority, Kenya)

- iii. The government (under the Federal Ministry of Housing & Urban Development) should immediately pass a **Regulation recognizing the National Building Code (with exclusion of the Part 111- Enforcement, most of which will have been considered under prayer 1 above but including provision for compulsory post construction Periodic Conditions Surveys of building and engineering structures)** as best practices in building and engineering design and construction processes.
- iv. The government should immediately **give recognition to the duty of Construction Health, Safety and Environment (CHSE) in the Nigeria building and construction industry** as an independent consultancy service for which a separate remuneration is chargeable on all private and public projects, and part of whom's product shall be a **CHSE Plan that must henceforth be submitted along with Project drawings, schedules and calculations when applying for Building Permits** for any development with one upper floor and above.

(The objective is to have a document similar to EIA's but focused on pre-estimation of all issues that may concern health and safety in respect of a proposed development. A further objective is to have dedicated personnel specifically focused on health and safety and who shall be the first point of enquiries should there be any issues concerning building collapse)

QSRBN SIGNS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH NBTE ON JOINT OF ACCREDITATION OF QUANTITY SURVEYING PROGRAMMES IN POLYTECHNICS AND MONOTECHNICS.

History was made on Thursday, 21st November, 2024 when the QSRBN successfully signed the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) on Joint accreditation of Quantity Surveying Programmes in Polytechnics and Monotechnic at the NBTE's liaison office in Abuja.

The delegation of the QSRBN was led by the Vice President of the Board, QS.
